
Our vision is

At Western Michigan University Homer Stryker M.D. School of Medicine (WMed), you will have the opportunity to teach medical students and receive an appointment as a clinical instructor. You will learn in two hospital settings nationally recognized for exceptional quality of care. In past years, Borgess Health and Bronson Healthcare have received no less than 100 awards and recognition for quality initiatives, including the Malcolm Baldrige National Quality Award, American Stroke Association Primary Stroke Center designation, and the American Hospital Association McKesson Quest for Quality Prize. The proven commitment to quality standards translates into a level of residency training experience that rivals major university medical centers while providing the advantage of a community-based patient population.

WMed extends the opportunity to serve the community's patient population in both the hospital setting as well as through outpatient care. Our state-of-the-art ambulatory care teaching center sees more than 61,000 annual visits in its numerous clinics and offers a full range of on-site ancillary services. We also see patients as part of the Kalamazoo Family Health Center, a federally qualified health center that serves an underserved patient population of more than 70,000 in Kalamazoo County.

Our residents are encouraged to participate in many research opportunities. In recent years, our Research Day has featured speakers recognized by the Institute of Medicine (IOM) and each year brings increased participation in our oral and poster presentations. We believe research establishes a foundation for quality care and enables us to share medical information that helps transform the lives of many.








WMed currently has over 200 residents, representing 40+ medical schools from all geographic regions of the United States.

We offer residency programs in Emergency Medicine, Family Medicine, General Surgery, Internal Medicine, Medicine-Pediatrics, Orthopaedic Surgery, Pediatrics, and Psychiatry. WMed has a primary care sports medicine fellowship and a new EMS/disaster medicine fellowship program. Opportunities for specialized training include an international health elective.

After completing their residency requirements, our residents feel fully prepared for the next step in their professional career, whether that be private practice, hospital positions, or fellowships of their choice. Some of our recent graduates are completing fellowships at M.D. Anderson Cancer Center, Harvard Medical School, the University of Connecticut, and Washington University, to name a few.



In serving a patient population of more than one million people, cases you will witness range from agricultural accidents in rural areas to trauma and diseases typical of an urban setting. Patients represent a vast range of demographics. Because of our size and location, we provide care for the underserved and see a large percentage of Medicaid patients on a regular basis. Our subspecialty clinics provide a wide range of specialized care typically found only in large metropolitan areas.

With more than 40,000 annual inpatient admissions and 164,000 emergency department visits to Borgess Medical Center and Bronson Methodist Hospital, both trauma centers, your training will be comprehensive. The facilities are less than 10 minutes from each other, and both are less than 10 minutes from WMed's Oakland Drive campus. This proximity enables WMed to provide a continuity clinic, allowing you to develop a patient rapport and gain practical ambulatory care experience.

You will also gain comprehensive experience from practicing in the sophisticated hospitals; both are nationally recognized in many areas such as cardiac and stroke care, as well as specialized pediatric services.

In addition to cooperating in graduate medical education, the hospitals have formed other joint ventures that you can be a part of—West Michigan Air Care, a regional air care transport program, and the West Michigan Cancer Center.

Enhancing the Educational Experience

RESEARCH

Research education for residents and students is an integral component of a highquality educational experience at WMed. The clinical research department goal is to help develop outstanding research, accomplished by involving students, residents and faculty in research activities, clinical trials, education on the research process, and mentoring programs.

Each year, more and more of our faculty, residents, students and staff participate with our Research Committee and our Clinical Research Scholar Leaders program. Over a 10-year period, research publications jumped nearly 400 percent and continue to increase.

Presentation opportunities in public forums of peers and health professionals from the community are also offered, including an annual Research Day in the spring. Research oriented scholarly activities are encouraged to foster the most updated and effective medical education opportunities for students, residents, and faculty, which greatly contribute to the enhancement of care for our patient population.

INTERNATIONAL HEALTH ROTATION

Residents at the PGY-II level or higher are eligible to participate in an international health rotation in a developing country. The elective focuses on poverty-related and tropical diseases and offers residents a rare opportunity to experience medical care in a cross-cultural environment.

Participating residents will treat patients without the benefits of modern-day technology or facilities and learn to rely solely on their medical knowledge and physical exam skills. Not only do residents gain experience by working with the local physicians, they share their experience with the latest in medical knowledge and procedural techniques with the local physicians.

Residents who have participated in this elective say that the experience has given them a new appreciation and awareness of the cultural diversity and poverty-related health issues in their own clinic practices.

TECHNOLOGY

Medical technology advances at a rapid rate. As a resident at WMed, you will have access to a wide range of state-of-the-art tools to help you learn and develop clinical skills. Residents who have chosen to train here indicate one reason they chose WMed was the widespread adoption of advanced medical and health information technologies such as the Simulation Center, digital radiography systems and the EMR systems at WMed's outpatient clinics and teaching hospitals. These residents know that learning to use these new technologies effectively will not only make them better practitioners, it will also provide them with a competitive advantage as they seek prestigious fellowships and challenging positions in their chosen specialties.

WMed offers a 24,382 square foot state-of-the-art Simulation Center with a virtual hospital and virtual clinic, as well as procedure rooms for clinical skills training.

The Center incorporates five types of simulation training, including:

- · Standardized patients and teaching associates
- Human patient simulation
- Virtual reality
- Task trainers
- Computerized simulation

In a simulated situation, learners master skills without putting patients at risk. Simulation offers many advantages, including:

- Experience with uncommon scenarios
- · Practice with crisis resource management procedures
- · Consistent, reproducible scenarios for standardized training
- Error-forgiving clinical experience that enhances patient safety
- Supervised instruction in life-threatening events management

The virtual hospital includes a three-bed trauma and emergency room, an operating room, a labor and delivery unit, two intensive care units, one pediatric unit, and two hospital inpatient units. The virtual hospital has a high-tech communications control room with the ability to record simulation training for playback and review—providing immediate feedback on training activities in three debriefing rooms. The virtual clinic includes 12 exam rooms and a dedicated communications control room. The space is used for training with standardized patients.

WMed has two industrial-style trailers outfitted as mobile labs that fully support simulation exercises—among the few mobile medical simulation units in the nation.

Patient Simulation Scenarios

High fidelity adult and infant patient simulators are used to create realistic patient scenarios clinicians may encounter in their practice. Sessions are generally conducted in small groups with a faculty instructor observing and leading the debriefing following the encounter. Working individually, collaboratively, or as part of a team, participants learn to assess problems quickly and develop and act on management plans. This type of environment allows for an intimate learning experience.

In addition to dozens of full-sized, passive manikins and various partial task trainers, the Simulation Center contains some of the latest computer-controlled, high fidelity, simulation manikins available, including:

- Adult Simulators (SimMan[®] 3G)
- Child Simulator (Pediatric HAL[®], SimJunior[®])
- Infant Simulators (SimBaby®)
- Neonatal Simulator (SimNew B®)
- Maternal Simulator (NOELLE[™] Birthing Simulator)
- Ultrasound Training Simulator (UltraSim® and SonoSim®)



Procedural Skills

Programs for procedural skills include the use of task trainers for knee aspiration, femoral line placement, full catheterization, advanced surgical procedures, including cricothyroidotomy, chest tube insertion, pericardiocentesis, diagnostic peritoneal lavage, and intravenous cut-down, and ultrasound guided central line insertion, to name a few. Medical students, residents, fellows, nurses and physicians all benefit from the use of these devices. The programs may be directed toward the novice learner or may be used for assessment and competency of skills.

Virtual Reality Trainers

The use of virtual reality systems allows the learner to practice individual skills while receiving haptic feedback from the device. The device tracks the performance of the learner and at the conclusion of the session immediate feedback is provided. The trainers record the individual's progress of the skill as they complete additional levels of complexity. These devices are valuable tools for assessing an individual's progress and competency level.

- Virtual Reality Laparoscopic Simulation Trainers provides learners with stepwise increases in task complexity. These tasks, which start out with rudimentary steps, are the building blocks of more complex surgical procedures which, when mastered and organized, allow users to manipulate laparoscopic equipment with more expertise and confidence.
- Immersion Endoscopy Trainer takes the user through flexible sigmoidoscopy, colonoscopy with biopsy, bronchoscopy, EGD and ERCP.
- Fundamentals of Laparoscopic Surgery (FLS) Trainer Box allows the user to complete six laparoscopy-associated tasks in the simulation environment.

Medical Library

WMed offers extensive web-based resources for educational and administrative purposes. The medical school Library is an all-digital biomedical library that provides an information resource collection that is entirely electronic and is available anywhere, anytime, and on any device. The Library is the primary source for biomedical information for WMed and provides customized access to electronic resources that directly supports medical education, clinical care, research and service. Residents and faculty have access to over 10,000 full-text peer-reviewed biomedical and life sciences journals, clinicalorientated e-textbooks and core biomedical databases and decision-making point of care applications. The Library provides electronic access to a number of major biomedical databases including AccessMedicine, ClinicalKey, PsychiatryOnline, PsycINFO, Procedures Consult, PubMed/MEDLINE, Scopus and UpToDate. A full list of the library's electronic resources is located at med.wmich.edu/library. A customized WMed PubMed search interface allows residents and faculty to connect to fulltext articles, when available, in the PubMed abstract view. The library offers Interlibrary Loan service for articles from journals not readily available online.

The Library is staffed by professionally-trained medical librarians, with masters in library and information science. The librarians are available to assist you in searching the medical literature, preparing for clinical rounds, finding evidencebased clinical care information, teaching citation management programs, preparing manuscripts or IRB proposals, and to participate on institutional projects. Librarians are accessible to residents and faculty during normal business hours through virtual chat, electronic mail, by telephone or appointment.





A Sense of Community

At WMed, you will find a commitment to Kalamazoo and southwest Michigan in the many activities our faculty, residents, and staff support.

WMed Cares About the Community It Serves

"Pink Saturdays" is a dynamic initiative offering free mammograms to uninsured or underinsured women in eight southwest Michigan counties during the month of October. The West Michigan Cancer Center and the southwest Michigan affiliate of the Susan G. Komen for the Cure partner with community healthcare providers, including WMed, the Kalamazoo County Health and Community Services Breast and Cervical Cancer Control Program, and our local hospitals to provide mammograms to hundreds of women during Breast Cancer Awareness Month. WMed faculty, residents, and nursing staff participate in providing surgical and follow-up care in both our General Surgery and Internal Medicine clinics. WMed has also been recognized for its immunization efforts—our Family Medicine, Pediatrics, and Medicine-Pediatrics clinics were awarded the Michigan Care Improvement Registry (MCIR) Private Provider Site of Excellence Award and the Flu Vaccination Challenge Gold Award from The Joint Commission.

Outside their roles in education and patient care, you will find many members of our faculty, residents, medical students, and staff participating in activities that better our community. Past service projects have included:

- Girls on the Run
- Events such as the Susan G. Komen Race for the Cure, the American Cancer Society's Making Strides Against Breast Cancer, and Kick-It for Children's Cancer
- Preparing and serving meals at local shelters, and food drives for local food pantries
- · Fundraising projects for the Hospital Hospitality House of Southwest Michigan
- The annual Toy Drive and Thanksgiving food baskets for the Salvation Army

MedMates

MedMates is an important part of the WMed residency experience. This group of resident spouses and significant others functions as a support system for one another as they all experience the residency training lifestyle. Members of this group work to create a sense of community, as most resident families are new to the Kalamazoo area. From where to shop and dine, information on local schools and daycare providers, even where to get a good haircut, the members of MedMates can provide helpful tips to new resident families. The MedMates organize several activities throughout the year, including events for families and for adults. They also volunteer in the Kalamazoo community and participate in a Day of Caring project each year as part of WMed's support of the United Way of the Battle Creek and Kalamazoo Region.

From welcoming new residents and their significant others with a casual reception during resident orientation to organizing playgroups and movie nights, the MedMates play an important role in the lives of resident families who are not only starting new training programs but also relocating to a new city.





KALAMAZOO... A GREAT PLACE TO LIVE AND WORK

Located halfway between Chicago and Detroit and just 35 miles from Lake Michigan, Kalamazoo is an important destination for business, education, and cultural events. Kalamazoo College is an elite fouryear private liberal arts and sciences college near downtown. Western Michigan University is a four-year public university with a full range of programs. Kalamazoo Valley Community College provides opportunities to enhance existing graduate degrees or to complete those already in progress.

Kalamazoo has a growing and thriving business community. International corporations such as Stryker employ thousands of Kalamazoo residents. With our state-granted status as a "Smart Zone," Kalamazoo is known as a region with many high-tech capabilities.
